Presidents Message

My natural impulse is to turn away from suffering, or to look for ways to rationalize it or explain it away. The tears, sweat, dirt, and pain of the human experience make me feel awkward, not sure what to do and afraid of saying the wrong thing. I began to change when I had children, and during the pandemic I have really leaned in. As a parent one is thrust into the most intimate and primal human experience. You can't look away from your child's needs, it messy and gross, and it is impossible to look like you've got it all under control. The pandemic is strikingly similar. Loss and fear are all around us, and the problems are so big they fill us with a sense of powerlessness. I have found that one of the most powerful ways to live with this amount of pain and grief is to lean in and speak directly to the human soul. In these moments we learn how to love. From the depth of sorrow comes a beautiful truth: we are not alone in pain.

Here are three examples:

I called the Temple's insurance representative at Church Mutual with a question about our policy. Without anywhere to be I wasn't in a rush, so I asked how she was doing. I could hear the rain hitting the roof of her backyard gazebo somewhere in Worcester as I watched the sun baking the cracked earth of my garden. Our lives are very different, but our fears and hopes are similar. We've spoken several times since and it feels like I've made a friend.

A famous, superstar economist spoke to our Rosh Chodesh group. As it turned out, her nanny had left her high and dry and she was overwhelmed by the same struggles as the rest of us. We spent the hour supporting each other, being vulnerable with each other, and growing closer.

I returned a phone call from a rabbi in Philadelphia looking for a cemetery plot for his cousin. We hung up after an hour and continued the conversation via email. I learned about his childhood in Cranston, the loneliness following the untimely death of his wife, his dreams of renting a vacation house in Rhode Island for his children and new grandchildren someday, and the solace he finds in fly-fishing. He is a professor at the Jewish Theological Seminary and he'd like to come to Temple Shalom and lead a discussion with us. I'm learning that if I give people my full attention and listen with my heart, we will both feel less alone.

The pandemic has laid bare the fragility of the world. It is easier to break than to build, and that means that every achievement is like a sandcastle waiting to be washed away by the tide. But faith is not to allow the fear, loneliness, or despair to be the final word. To believe that our trajectory is in the ascendant and that we will overcome this; that as dark as things look, the dawn is coming. Our work at Temple Shalom is to make the world as good and fair as we can, and that works begins here and now. We are not alone. We are connected by the roots of the tree of life and we are growing out of darkness towards the light.

THE CANTOR'S CORNER



We are in a very strange place as we are struggling to create a new way of sharing our upcoming High Holiday Season. As I am exploring just exactly how we can find meaning in these years High Holy Days, I am overwhelmed with thoughts of our Untaneh Tokef prayer. I am drawn specifically to the paragraph with the refrain: **“B’rosh Hashan yikateivu u’v’yom tom kippur y’chateimun”**. On Rosh Hashanah it is written, on Yom Kippur it is sealed. . . Who shall live, and who shall die. Who by water, or fire, or plague. It is sobering liturgy to say the least. In the month leading up to Rosh Hashanah, we begin our spiritual preparation by the addition of a psalm at the end of our worship. We also sound the shofar. The final wakeup call is **Selichot**. Never in my lifetime has this practice been more important, so as to be open our hearts and souls to the self-examination that Tefila is to us. Self-Examination. We read it. We hear it in the sounding of the Shofar as well as melodies that carry our words heaven word. The great difficulty this year is that we cannot sing together, for our own health. This is the current law here in RI. There is no communal singing allowed in public gathered worship. The sounding of the shofar is also not allowed, among other reasons because it is prohibited on Shabbat. I would ask for you to spend some time studying the liturgy of the High Holy Days. **Untaneh Tokef** as well as Kol Nidrei. Look at them with a new kind of 2020 vision. Fresh and clean. I also ask you to be kind to others and to your selves. Repentance, Prayer and Acts of Righteousness avert the severe decree. Shana Tova. **To a HEALTHY and Good New Year**. May the book of life be open to us all as we prepare.


At age 16 I spent the summer on a backpacking program in the Rocky Mountains. We carried a small Torah and celebrated Shabbats in the wilderness. I learned that being outdoors and especially in the wilderness, our attention is brought closer and closer to the present moment, fundamental for any spirituality. In future years I led the same program as well as planning and teaching other outdoor Jewish education.

Taking to heart the Oneness of G-d, I’ve felt comfortable exploring other traditions. For a number of years I practiced Buddhist meditation and eventually was trained to teach a kind of Theravada Buddhism. I never felt at-odds with my Jewishness or Judaism, but rather always buoyed by the foundations laid in my childhood and youth.

Now as the parent of a young child, I’ve begun reaching for the lessons and experiences that inform my knowledge of truth and our role in the world. I continue to wrestle with what it means to be Jewish, and what the tradition has to offer us today.

My family and I are happy and grateful to join the community at Temple Shalom! I look forward to sharing more with you in prayer and discussion, as we explore our ancient tradition in 2020 / 5781.



September 18-20 & 27-28

Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year, is one of Judaism's holiest days. Meaning "head of the year" or "first of the year," the festival begins on the first day of Tishrei, the seventh month of the Hebrew calendar. Rosh Hashanah commemorates the creation of the world and marks the beginning of the Days of Awe, a 10-day period of introspection and repentance that culminates in the Yom Kippur holiday, also known as the Day of Atonement. Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are the two "High Holy Days" in the Jewish religion.

TEMPLE HAPPENINGS



Congratulations to Temple Shalom board member Lindsay Lieberman on her admission to the Rhode Island bar! She is excited to expand her legal practice into Rhode Island. Lindsay is a sexual privacy attorney who represents victims of sexual assault, cyber abuse, and domestic violence. Specializing in nonconsensual pornography and cyber harassment, Lindsay obtains judgments, settlements, and orders of protection for her clients and removes their intimate content from the internet.

Prior to joining the leading sexual privacy firm, C.A. Goldberg PLLC, Lindsay was a sex crimes prosecutor in Brooklyn, New York. She graduated cum laude from Brooklyn Law School in 2011, and is licensed to practice law in Rhode Island, New York, and New Jersey. She is a member of the Rhode Island Women's Bar Association, the New York Bar Association's Sex and the Law Committee, and the Cyber Sexual Abuse Task Force. She is also an adjunct professor at Salve Regina University.

Lindsay lives in Newport with her husband, Isaac Kardon, 10 month old daughter, and two rescue dogs, Ralph and Harry, who you may often see featured on Temple Shalom's social media.

High Holidays Services: Temple Shalom's plans for the High Holidays have been informed by our participation in a group of synagogues convened by the Jewish Alliance. We have learned from experts at the Rhode Island Department of Health and leaders of the Board of Rabbis. Most congregations are holding virtual High Holidays services, and some (particularly Orthodox congregations) are holding outdoor services. Each leader is modifying and adapting the services in different ways, including pre-recording parts of the service and shortening services. Cantor Scheff and Daniel Berkman are planning services to meet our needs as best as possible.

Fundraising: Sara Meirowitz is leading Temple Shalom's efforts to seek grant-funding for our technology, health, and safety needs. Temple Shalom has or will apply to the Rhode Island Foundation, Jewish Alliance, and Rhode Island Department of Health for funding for computers, video cameras, tri-pods, hot spots, data plans, Zoom accounts, Plexiglass, masks, and hand sanitizer.

Kitchen: The utility sink has been installed in the supply closet and the application for a non-profit commercial kitchen license has been submitted. We are waiting for the Department of Health to schedule a visit.

Cleaning: Marcia Meirowitz, Ellen Shallcross, and Chelsea Rose have cleaned the supply closet. Marcia donated 8 full kitchen and dining sets to Lucy's Hearth. Liz Sandler has been selling assorted kitchen gear, and we're well on our way to having just what we reasonably need. Marcia has also been cleaning the school and setting up a children's playroom in the Board room off the social hall.

Educational Activities: Lindsay Lieberman is arranging a virtual presentation by Keith Stokes on Jewish history in Newport, and Evan Shallcross's postponed lecture on Russia and Crimea. Stay tuned for more information!

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
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
